

JOHNNIE L. COCHRAN, JR. CIVIL RIGHTS FELLOWSHIP AT NEUFELD SCHECK & BRUSTIN, LLP

Neufeld Scheck & Brustin, LLP (NSB) (www.nsbcivilrights.com) seeks applicants for an immediate opening for the Johnnie L. Cochran, Jr. Civil Rights Fellowship. NSB is a small plaintiffs' civil rights law firm in New York City devoted primarily to police misconduct and other civil rights and constitutional litigation. Formerly Cochran Neufeld & Scheck, LLP, the firm was founded in 1998 by Peter Neufeld, Barry Scheck and the late Johnnie L. Cochran, Jr. NSB currently is lead counsel in approximately 25 individual and multi-plaintiff cases throughout the country, each of which with potential to promote systemic reforms in police departments and other large private and public institutions throughout the United States. Many of NSB's cases are § 1983 suits on behalf of exonerees seeking redress for their wrongful convictions.

The Johnnie L. Cochran, Jr. Civil Rights Fellowship represents NSB's commitment to helping train the next generation of civil rights lawyers. The selection criteria and process reflect NSB's goal to identify an early-career lawyer with a demonstrated commitment to civil rights and social justice. Applicants also must possess exceptional analytical and writing skills and creativity, as well as the ability to work independently and undertake significant responsibility from the outset of the fellowship.

NSB is currently recruiting for a fellowship position beginning as soon as possible, and no later than fall 2019. Although NSB has a preference for applicants who will have completed at least one judicial clerkship by the start of the fellowship, candidates with 1-5 years of litigation experience or other relevant social justice work experience are also encouraged to apply. The fellow should also be a member of the NY bar or willing to become a member of the NY bar.

A fellow with one year of clerkship experience will receive \$85,000 for the first year, plus benefits. A fellow with two or more years of clerkship experience will receive \$90,000 for the first year, plus benefits. The fellowship salary increases in the second year.

Former NSB civil rights fellows have gone on to a variety of positions in the field of civil rights law, including representing indigent defendants and Guantanamo detainees, as well as teaching law at the University of Virginia, Yale University, Fordham University, the City University of New York, Columbia University and the University of Texas at Austin, and clerkships with federal appellate courts, including the United States Supreme Court.
